Citizen Bike Advocacy Efforts City Now Working with Us

Sustainable Stillwater MN is dedicated to creating a healthier lifestyle for all and reducing our carbon footprint. Biking checks off both goals. The Lift Bridge Loop Trail has given us opportunities to improve our local biking amenities and the economy by encouraging all these bicyclists to visit downtown. A bike-friendly Stillwater is coming, thanks to our presentations to city officials and committees

includes designated spaces for permanent bike racks, price quotes for rack purchases, and final implementation of plans with the city.

Education is also part of our effort, which includes promotion of bike etiquette on the trails and bike safety. We are collaborating with the Stillwater Police Department to align activities such as bicycle education, bike rodeos, communication, and enforcement of biking and trail rules. Articles our members have written on bike rules and safety have appeared in our monthly column in the Stillwater Gazette and the City of Stillwater's quarterly newsletter. The Bike-Friendly team is creating a draft of a city bicycle education plan that includes the training of certified cycling instructors and we are working with city schools to support the curriculum.

SSMN GreenStep Progress Report

One of our greatest accomplishments as a citizen's group was getting Stillwater to become a GreenStep City. **GreenStep is a state program** that provides a framework for making communities green and sustainable. Each month, the SSMN GreenStep Team, now led by Linda Countryman, meets with the city's GreenStep coordinator Graham Tate, to push for more progress. Here are some of the things SSMN and the City accomplished together in 2020!


- Living Streets: a Community Thread Connector Loop was started to connect riders to area housing, retail, businesses, and other destinations.
- The 2040 Comprehensive Plan placed Stillwater well on the way to high scoring in the areas of density planning, mixed-use development, and conservation of natural areas, especially in the Liberty and Legends communities.
- Best Practices for public and private tree planting and an Emerald Ash Borer management plan have been adopted.
- LEDs, reseeding/irrigation, a new river park, and a downtown connection to the Gateway Bike Trail are coming in 2021.
- Local Food: Many best-practice efforts are in place, such as the creation of an Ag Preservation District. Bee-keeping and chickens are allowed in most districts; the Saturday Farmer's Market is going strong; and a buy-local relationship now exists between Axdahl Farm and local grocery stores, restaurants, and distributors.
- Business synergies are happening with shared parking; a brewery has been reused as a hotel, and the local post office has installed a permeable parking lot to absorb rainwater.

Next, we are looking to get the city to adopt sustainable design practices that make our city safe and fun for pedestrians and bicyclists. Our Bike-Friendly Community team is working on that (article above).

Finally, we did a demonstration and Zoom conference with Graham Tait to invite the city to participate in our Green Business Directory. Green business development is another GreenStep that the city can achieve! Hopefully, we will hear something soon.

Several of our Green Business Directory applicants have been pleasantly surprised that they could apply for a \$10,000 grant from BizRecycling to pay for everything from a few months of organic waste-hauling to a trash compactor or dishwasher.

Cigarette Disposal Containers Still Available!

The SSMN cigarette container program has been in operation for over a year in downtown Stillwater, maintained by businesses and our volunteer Bob Barratt. There are less than a dozen left, so let us know if you can use one! Free containers are placed by Stillwater Public Works on poles near businesses that have agreed to adopt and empty them regularly. The maintenance of a container is very simple: just check it and empty it about every other week until you know how often it needs to be emptied -- the containers can hold a lot of cig butts and do not really need to be emptied very often.

We currently have approximately 31 containers in place downtown. The newest is behind GreenBridge Coffee Shop & Mikes Bikes. Additionally, we are working with Hotel Lora and Wolf Brewery to get containers placed near their locations. Of all the containers downtown, there are nine that have not been "adopted" by local businesses that are being checked and emptied by Bob. We welcome

Invasive Plants and Lily LakeReed Canary Grass (Pictured)

In case you have noticed the abundance of tall look-alike plants swaying in the winds along the Lily Lake Park shoreline this summer, be assured that they are part of a long term plan to make Lily Lake a cleaner lake. If you think the shoreline looks uninterestingly the same everywhere, you are right. It is dominated by reed canary grass and narrow leaf cattail. These are tall plants with strong roots that can push their way into disturbed areas where the natural diversity of plants have been destroyed by trampling, construction, road salting, flooding, or erosion. These conditions have long existed around Lily Lake Park, a historically high-use recreation city center.

Although these invasive plants are boringly dominant, they are still functioning in favor of the water quality of Lily Lake. For example, **reed canary grass** thrives on water high in nutrients, even in wastewater treatment ponds! **Reed canary grass** is in the category of an invasive plant because it pushes out smaller plants using its dense, persistent root base; it also blocks sunlight from getting to shorter plants. Since it does not get discouraged easily, it grows right back after cutting and digging it out,

Narrow Leaf Cattail

The other invasive species, narrow-leaf cattail, is very tolerant of salt. During winter, the streets and parking lots may be salted for driving and walking safety. Since narrow-leaf cattails can survive salty water better than other plants, they can thrive when spring snowmelt and rainfall start moving across the land; as they "stand their ground," they are also holding the soil in place even as snow is melting and rain is pounding.

Lily Lake Rain Garden

Sustainable Stillwater MN has offered to try to make at least the rain garden more interesting -- the small fenced space between the pier and the boat launch. Although reed canary grass dominates near shore in the rain garden, there is some opportunity to diversify further inland. We are in the midst of selecting plants that have a chance to survive and hopefully thrive, to make the rain garden more interesting and colorful.
